## **Explanatory notes**

- 1. Students who analyse a food related ethical dilemma for New Zealand society will:
  - explain the nature of the ethical dilemma
  - explain contrasting viewpoints of groups/stakeholders associated with it
  - explain how the ethical dilemma may affect New Zealand society.

Students who analyse in depth an ethical dilemma for New Zealand society will:

- explore the underlying beliefs, values, and practices for the groups/stakeholders with contrasting view points on the dilemma
- explain how the underlying beliefs, values, and practices influence viewpoints relating to the ethical dilemma.

Students who analyse comprehensively an ethical dilemma will:

- critically evaluate the viewpoints of different stakeholders and outline some possible consequences and challenges for New Zealand society.
- A food related ethical dilemma is one that challenges beliefs, values and practices related to food. An ethical dilemma requires a choice to be made between two or more options. All options may be equally desirable, or they may all be morally acceptable but mutually exclusive.

### TASK 1

Write a report in which you analyse comprehensively the following food related ethical dilemma for New Zealand society. **Suggested word limit 3,000 words.** 

Is it ethical to use intensive food production systems (battery and colony cages) to produce eggs?

It is the intent of this standard that we are analysing a food related ethical dilemma for New Zealand – so focus on exploring groups/stakeholders viewpoints rather than your own personal opinion about the dilemma.

- 1. Explain the nature of the ethical dilemma for example:
  - generally what is the ethical dilemma that you are analysing?
  - why/how is it of public concern?
  - · what is it about it that makes this dilemma controversial?
  - · why are eggs important to New Zealand society?
- 2. Identify groups/stakeholders that hold contrasting viewpoints about the dilemma, they will be either for/support OR against/oppose.
- 3. Explain their contrasting viewpoints (what and why) and include the reasoning for these viewpoints, for example:
  - do they support or oppose the practice of using battery and/or colony caged chickens to produce eggs
  - · what do they believe is right or wrong
  - · where do these ideas come from
  - · what attitudes, values and/or beliefs do they hold and why
  - how do their attitudes, values and beliefs relate to the ethical foundations.
- 4. Explain how this ethical dilemma may affect the well-being of New Zealand society, for example:
  - consider those directly affected by the dilemma, others associated with these people and wider societal implications
  - · weigh up the pros and cons of the viewpoints in relation to individual and societal well-being
  - outline possible consequences and challenges for NZ society.

Make sure you have used a system to acknowledge the references you have used to develop your analysis (in-text and end of text).
