Overview:

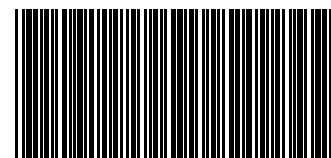
Achievement Standard 91004 History 1.4 requires you to demonstrate an understanding of different perspectives (or views) held by people in history topics you have studied. You are also required to describe and explain actions taken by people which reflect their perspectives.

Conditions:

- This is an individual activity. It is 'open book' but the answers must be your own work.
- There is no time limit, but it is expected that the tasks should take about one and a half hours to complete.
- You may do your own additional research for the tasks before answering them.
- Plagiarism detection software may be used to check this is your own work.

HISTORY

JUNE 1967 – THE SIX DAY WAR

Context

The context for this assessment is the period 1948–1967 in Palestine-Israel, which saw the creation of the state of Israel in 1948 and ongoing tension and conflict between Israel and its Arab neighbours from this time.

Role playing as a skill

To answer the questions in the assessment you will be asked to assume different roles. You need to write or speak in the way that person would write or speak and to express their views in an authentic or genuine way.

Task instructions

It is late June 1967, just after the 'Six Day War'. You are a reporter investigating the conflict involving Israel in the Middle East from 1960 to 1967.

- Write the responses for all THREE people from the list below. For each person write what they would have said in an interview to answer each of the questions that follow. Make their replies to the questions as authentic and genuine as you can.
- Write your answers on the pages at the end of the activity.

PERSON 1: Levi Eshkol, Prime Minister of Israel in 1967

PERSON 2: Gamal Nasser, President of Egypt

PERSON 3: Yasser Arafat, a leading member within the Palestine Liberation Organisation (PLO)

Why do you hold this view?

QUESTION 3

What is **one** particular action that you, or the group you represent, took in relation to the conflict involving Israel between 1960 and 1967?

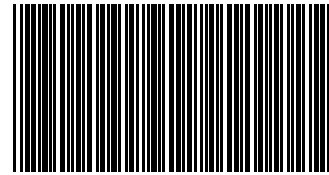
QUESTION 4
